
Home Learning - Tuesday 31st March



This week we are going to work on some themes — today's theme is:



Weather

Take a look at the learning suggestions and then choose some things to explore. You don't have to do everything.

- Listen to the animated story 'After the Storm' online: https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=7dyCkleWRzo
- What's the weather like? Keep a weather digry for the next few weeks look out for plants beginning to grow as well and write about them.
- Try making an animal mask
- Reflect a rainbow.

What you need: Glass of water, sheet of white paper, sunlight.

What to do: Fill the glass all the way to the top with water. Put the glass of water on a table so that it is half on the table and half off the table (make sure that the glass doesn't fall!) Then, make sure that the sun can shine through the glass of water. Next, place the white sheet of paper on the floor. Adjust the piece of paper and the glass of water until a rainbow forms on the paper.

• Create your own miniature water cycle

What you need: Ziploc bag, water, blue food colouring, Sharpie pen, tape.

What to do: Pour 1/4 cup of water and a few drops of blue food colouring into bag. Seal tightly and tape the bag to a (preferably south-facing) wall. As the water warms in the sunlight the water will evaporate into vapour. As the vapour cools, it will begin changing into liquid (condensation) just like a cloud. When the water condenses enough, the air will not be able to hold it and the water will fall down in the form of precipitation.
