## Asia Class (yr 4)

The class had a great time at Gressenhall Rural Life Museum this week discovering what life would have been like as a Victorian child. They began the day down at the farmhouse finding out how to cook on a range and the long process of keeping clothes clean. Next, they had a look at the heavy horses before going out into the fields to stone pick. After lunch, it was time for a lesson in the school house chanting rhymes, using an abacus and practising writing on a slate. Finally, they went into the workhouse to learn about the conditions people lived in and the jobs they would have had to have done such as picking oakum.

Throughout this time the children had to listen out carefully for clues in order to solve the mystery of who stole the candlesticks – I think it is fair to say that at the end of the day they were all a little surprised to find out who the culprit was!











## South America Class (yr 4)


**In History** this week, the class have been learning about the Maya civilization and their sacred buildings. Some of the children made one of their temples and discovered that the Mayans painted their temples red to represent blood as they viewed them as a living thing.

**In Science**, they have been looking at sound and how we hear. They discussed how it is really important to look after and protect our hearing by muffling loud sounds. They worked in teams to make ear defenders to test against sounds.

**In English,** they made the most of the sunshine by editing their explanation texts together, using lots of strategies to support their editing skills to ensure their work meets success criteria.







## Asia Class (yr 5)

Linked to their science learning surrounding life cycles, Harry in Year 5's dad kindly brought in their partridge chicks that have recently hatched. The children thoroughly enjoyed being able to hold the chicks, as well as learning all about them and how to know which are boys and which are girls. We are looking forward to seeing photos of them growing and hearing all about them from Harry!

#### This week

Look how much our caterpillars have grown! The children are VERY excited to see them grow even bigger before they form chrysalis'. We've learnt all about the lifecycle of butterflies, making our own craft for this too. We have been caring for our plants too, inside the classroom on the window sills and outside in our greenhouse. It won't be long before we can plant these out! We are super excited to see some of our sunflowers germinating and are looking forward to measuring these as they grow. During our phonics sessions this week, we have learnt the sound 'x', as well as consolidating sounds we have already learnt. We began story mapping 'The Runaway Pea' in literacy. In maths we have looked at 'more than' and 'fewer than' and will consolidate this in following weeks. We have also been talking more about the human life cycle — looking at the different stages: baby, toddler, child, teenager, adult, elderly. We enjoyed the sunshine on Wednesday and Thursday with lots of outdoor learning — we've planted some beans to watch grow in bags on the windows.





#### Next week

Next week in our phonics sessions, we will continue to consolidate all phonemes learnt so far, before we move onto special friends! We will continue our learning surrounding our story book 'The Runaway Pea', finishing off story mapping and making marks of our own. In maths, we will look at 2D shapes. Having talked lots about plants and their life cycles, we will move onto a focus on animal life cycles.

We will continue to care for our growing plants and make observations of this growth.

#### Learning links at home

- Go on a bug hunt. What did you find? Can you draw a picture of the different insects you found?
- Make the most of the spring sunshine and get outside to do some mark making. You could use a tub of water and a paintbrush, chalks or even a broom and water.
- Help your grown up to hang the washing on the line in the spring sunshine and help to develop your motor skills at the same time, squeezing the pegs together is a great workout for your fingers!
